Votre enfant s'exercera à :

- Lire et comprendre des questions complètes en anglais;
- Identifier correctement les adverbes interrogatifs à employer pour formuler des questions;
- Inventer et formuler ses propres questions à poser à des gens de son entourage.

- Prendre connaissance du questionnaire Quiz Whiz sur Nat Geo Kids;
- Guider votre enfant dans le bon choix des mots interrogatifs lors du jeu d'Allo Prof;

Instructions

Learn more about question words with this activity! There are many ways to ask questions in English and it is important to know which question word to use in each situation.

When do you get up in the morning?

How often do you eat meat in a week?
